MESSAGE FROM PASTOR LOIS

I say that to you for the second time in three months (the third, if you are reading this after worship on January 1), because the new "church year" (the cycle of liturgical seasons and Bible readings) started with the first Sunday of Advent (which, at Reformation, is probably better known as "Spaghetti Day").

Thanks be to God, each of us can "hit the reset button" at any

time by assessing our shortcomings and then recommitting ourselves in grateful response to the understanding that we are already a "new creation" in Christ (2 Corinthians 5:17). It can, however, be helpful to start on a particular date like the beginning of the new secular (calendar) year. I invite you to develop 3-5 goals for 2023, and I challenge you to include at least one "SMART" goal (specific, measurable, achievable, relevant, and time-bound) related to your

I shared these dreams during our annual meeting on December 11, and a condensed copy of the handout I used is provided in this newsletter. For your convenience, it references pertinent pages in the annual report and recent newsletters, and it has been updated to reflect activities that occurred after the annual meeting.

And remember, I really want to continue hearing from you with answers to this question about our ministry together: "What is God up to HERE?"

BE AN ASSISTING MINISTER

In the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA), the Assisting Minister is typically a layperson; however, rostered leaders (pastors and deacons) can also serve in that capacity. This is the role that Reformation used to call the "worship assistant."

Simply put, the Assisting Minister assists the Presiding Minister

(Pastor Lois or, in her absence, the "pulpit supply" minister). The Assisting Minister wears an alb (white robe) when the Presiding Minister does, but they do not wear a stole unless they are a pastor or deacon. If they can carry it, they may bring the ceremonial cross in and out of the sanctuary in lieu of a crucifer. If they can sing, they may lead the kyrie in lieu of a cantor. They sit next to the Presiding Minister sits near the organ, and they stand next to the Presiding Minister when the Presiding Minister stands at the altar. They offer some of the prayers, serve as a back-up reader, and help distribute communion.

We would like to have at least three people take turns serving in this capacity starting on January 15. Pastor Lois will provide written instructions and a walk-through tutorial. To volunteer, please contact Pastor Lois.

CHOIR RE-EMERGES

January once again brings to us new opportunities here at Reformation. In the area of Music Ministry, we now are beginning to assemble a group of people who enjoy singing during worship services and who also can envision themselves as part of our informal choir. Rehearsals will be held on alternate odd-number weeks, starting on January 15th; they will be held in the sanctuary at 8:45 am on Sunday mornings.

Below are twelve reasons why we know you will enjoy choir here at Reformation:

- 1. Our informal setting makes choir at Reformation fun and relaxing.
- 2. Choir is free. You do not need to spend money to be in choir!
- 3. Choir members do not wear vestments.
- 4. Choir members will be able to sit with their friends and family members during worship.
- 5. Choir requires no preparation. All your materials will be ready and waiting for you on Sunday mornings. (However, don't forget to bring your glasses!)
- 6. Because our rehearsals are held on Sunday mornings, you will be driving in broad daylight through light traffic.
- 7. You already are dressed for church, so you are all set in the wardrobe department.
- 8. Because choir meets every other week, you are not on a rehearsal attendance treadmill which might restrict the flexibility of your life.
- 9. This initial choir plunge will be a short-term commitment of seven rehearsals.
- 10. Reformation families who live in neighboring communities here in Florida are already headed for church on Sunday morning, so choir members will have only one trip for both worship and rehearsal. More convenience and less expenditure on gas!
- 11. Because our choir is informal in style and approach (by design), it is an excellent opportunity to try choir for the first time or to try choir again after a hiatus from choir.
- 12. Because praising God always is the primary object of all worship, Reformation's choir will be less focused on musical perfection and more focused on friends helping friends to enjoy corporate singing.



"END OF THIS LIFE" SEMINAR ON JANUARY 26TH

This is the "new and improved" version of a seminar we first offered in August. Based on the feedback received, we added Kiefer Exum (a Lakeland-based attorney who specializes in elder law).



We will meet on Thursday, January 26, at 10:00 a.m. in the Fellowship Hall. Please reserve your spot by Sunday, January 22. You can do so using the sign-up sheet in the narthex or sending an e-mail R.S.V.P. to lovinglutherans@gmail.com.

The seminar will cover some difficult but necessary topics, so that you are better equipped to make decisions and have meaningful discussions with your loved ones. Topics to be covered will include: Florida's "Do Not Resuscitate" (DNR) form, Advanced Directives and other legal documents to

protect yourself and your loved ones, documents to have on-hand for various final arrangements, information that goes into planning a funeral or memorial, and cremation as one option to consider when pre-arranging what will happen to your earthly remains.

Each participant will be given a copy of Reformation's "End of THIS Life" worksheet (which helps you organize the documents and funeral/memorial-planning information your loved ones will need) and a copy of Florida's DNR form. Participants can expect to learn from each other's experiences as well as the presenters (Attorney Kiefer Exum, Pastor Lois, and Terry McNeil, Certified Pre-Arrangement Advisor for the National Cremation Society).

LET'S INVEST IN AN OUTCOME!

As I say each month, "Giving to church is an investment in an outcome", not just paying the electric bill. Yes, we do need to pay the electric bill but by so doing we are able to provide worship both in-person and online, furnish services to our community, like packing lunches for the homeless, collecting school supplies, providing Christmas for foster kids, and above all, receiving the spiritual health and blessings we all need.

When the 2022 Spending Plan was approved, I projected that we would have a financial shortfall for the year. Like all of us, Reformation is feeling the increased costs of everything. Through November, we have received \$143,265 from various sources including several families who gave their entire annual commitment




in January or February. Our expenses total \$156,458.

Plans are to have VANCO, an online giving opportunity, available in early January. As soon as we receive the new computer system, we will begin the setup with VANCO.

At the annual congregational meeting in December, the

2023 Spending Plan was approved as proposed. Projected income for 2023 is \$133,521; projected expenses are \$191,832. Each donated dollar will go to support the following missions:



"TOWN HALL" MEETING ON JANUARY 29TH



At our annual "business" meeting on December 11, Pastor Lois invited us to "dream dreams" of our own for this congregation so that we could share and compare at the next "town hall" meeting. Her dreams for us are found pn page 7 in this newsletter.

Each "town hall" meeting is intended as an informal listening session, during which lay and ordained leadership a chance to

hear directly from members and friends of the congregation. What questions, concerns, and dreams do you have about Reformation? Let's talk on January 29, immediately following worship, in the fellowship hall.

PRAY, PARTICIPATE, AND PROVIDE

During 2023, we are planning to emphasize "time" and "talent" stewardship. This is not to suggest that "treasure" (financial support) is not important; rather, we need all three T's to continue growing as stewards of all the abundance that God has given us as individuals and as a congregation.



PRAY - Even if health or other circumstances make it impossible for you to offer any "talent" to the congregation, you can certainly devote "time with God" in the form of prayer!

- Pray for Reformation's leadership (council members, committee chairs, and Pastor Lois).
- Pray for members and friends of the congregation, whether current names on our prayer list or faces on a random page of our church directory.
- Pray for additional income streams from serving the community, such as how we already receive donations from AARP and Oasis (the Spanish-speaking congregation) for using our facilities.
- Pray for the students, teachers, and staff of Padgett Elementary or for the clients and staff of Talbot House and Guardian Ad Litem.
- Pray for lasting and equitable solutions to food insecurity, homelessness, hate crimes, and other injustices in our community (including ways in which Reformation could contribute).

PARTICIPATE – Sometimes the only "talent for God" you need to offer the congregation is dependability and a willingness to try. In addition to attending weekly worship (whether in-person or online), please:

- Participate in answering the phones and other secretarial tasks on Thursday morning.
- Participate in worship as an usher, audio/visual operator, choir member, instrumental or vocal artist, Assisting Minister, or Altar Guild member.
- Participate in "commission care" evangelism by simply greeting visitors, answering their questions, or asking them to sit with you during worship.
- Participate in "coffee hour" and other fellowship events by helping with set-up, clean-up, or refreshments (including baking).
- Participate in the planning and implementation of Reformation's community outreach projects, or volunteer directly in the community.

PROVIDE – At the congregational level, this is where your "treasure to God" offerings and special gifts come into play. Please also do your part to provide what was recently asked of us in a letter from Reverend Pedro Suarez (Bishop of our Florida-Bahamas Synod):

- **Pray Regularly** for the good works of other congregations in this synod (Pastor Lois suggests you include prayers for the Bishop, all four assistants to the bishop, and other synod staff).
- **Participate Fully** in synod gatherings and requests for input (for example, we still need a "voting member" to attend the synod assembly in June).
- **Provide Generously** through mission support and other contributions to the synod (Reformation exceeded its 2022 covenant to the synod for mission support; if we simply keep doing what we have been doing, you can "check-off" this request as "done").

LUTHERANISM 101: BAPTISM

"We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins" – Nicene Creed

One way to characterize a Christian denomination is whether they practice "believer baptism" (the individual proclaims their faith in God by being baptized) or "belonging baptism" (a faith community claims the individual on behalf of God through their baptism). The ELCA (Evangelical Lutheran Church in America) is a "belonging baptism" denomination. This is why infants and young children may be baptized (not just older children, teens, and adults), and why baptism normally takes place in the midst of a worshiping assembly (such as during a Sunday service).

We believe that, through baptism (one of only two sacraments recognized by the ELCA), God puts our old sinful self to death and gives us a new spiritual birth. This is not "one and done" individual transformation; it means that we have been adopted into the family of God, including a "church family" through which we will be nurtured to continue growing in faith our whole lives (which is why bodily death is referred to has the completion of our baptismal journey). Another image of the church is the mystical Body of Christ: baptism makes us members of a living organism that has Jesus as its head. Pastor Lois likes to add that the Holy Spirit is its heart.

If you -- or someone you love -- has not been baptized, questions the validity of their baptism, or has questions about the sacrament, please contact Pastor Lois for assistance.

PROVIDE A BAG LUNCH



On the third Sunday of each month we pack lunches for our homeless neighbors and their doggie companions, a "God's Work, Our Hands" project we

started in 2021. To date in 2022, we have had 36 volunteers who made sandwiches and packed 235 lunches. Your monthly donation of \$5 per household purchases the perishable food but we also need donations of both dry and canned dog food (must have pull tab openings) as well as treats. We also collect travel size personal care items to be distributed as needed.

- ⇒ External Communication (critique existing efforts, update and expand the website, post and share pictures and other material on social media, identify advertising and other means of reaching select neighborhoods or special interest groups)
- ⇒ Un(der)Churched Engagement (invite repeat visitors to coffee hour and other congregation events, provide church representation at community events, establish a connection with Florida Polytechnic University, work with standing committees to capitalize on evangelizing aspects of their events).

This new team is being formed as a subcommittee of the Evangelism Committee, but you need not attend monthly meetings to contribute to its success. The goal is to tap-into individual and small group activities to complement existing member-oriented "Congregational Care" efforts, focusing on getting to know and getting to be known by people who are not affiliated with the congregation (yet).
