HELP WANTED: OFFICE VOLUNTEER



We already have an office volunteer on Tuesday mornings (usually Karen Wason, who focuses on drafting and publishing the Sunday bulletin).

We would ALSO like to have an office volunteer on Thursday mornings. It doesn't need to be the same person every week, so please help if you can.

The office volunteer's #1 responsibility on Thursday mornings would be to answer the phone and return voicemail messages so that Pastor Lois can better focus on receiving drop-in office visits and making member care calls.

What else the office volunteer would do will depend on their current abilities or what they want to learn. Possibilities include: being the "pew angel" (restocking envelopes and "connect cards" in the sanctuary), helping Pastor follow-up with new visitors, organizing the congregation's paper and electronic files, collecting and combining committee reports for the annual report (November/ December only), and helping committees update their written policies by reviewing and/or typing committee documents.

We will put a sign-up sheet in the narthex. Please give it serious your consideration (or, if it is not for you, say a prayer that a few people will step forward).

HELP WANTED: ASSISTING MINISTER

In the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA), the Assisting Minister during worship is typically a layperson. This is the role that Reformation used to call the "worship assistant."

Simply put, the Assisting Minister assists the Presiding Minister (usually Pastor Lois or, in her absence, the "pulpit supply" minister).



The Assisting Minister wears an alb (white robe) when the Presiding Minister does, but they do not wear a stole (unless they are a pastor or deacon instead of a layperson). If they can carry it, they may bring the ceremonial cross in and out of the sanctuary in lieu of a crucifer. If they can sing, they may lead the kyrie in lieu of a cantor. They sit next to Presiding Minister when the Presiding Minister sits near the organ, and they stand next to the Presiding Minister when the Presiding Minister stands at the altar. They offer some of the prayers, serve as a back-up reader, and help distribute communion.

Two people have expressed an interest in serving in this capacity. We want one or two more! Written instructions and a walk-through tutorial (in other words, practice) will be provided. To volunteer, please contact Pastor Lois.

AARP Tax-Aide FREE INCOME TAX PREPARATION

AARP Foundation Tax-Aide offers free tax preparation help to anyone. They understand that retirement or other life changes may mean your taxes are a little more complicated now. With the help of their team of IRS-certified volunteers they make it easy for you. AARP membership is not required.

Tax preparation in 2023 will be by <u>appointment only</u> — they will not be processing any walk-ins. You can schedule an appointment by stopping at the fellowship hall on either Monday (8-12) or Thursday (8-4) beginning Thursday, February 2nd. Information packets will be available for pick up when you schedule an appointment.

All volunteers are trained and certified by AARP/IRS to prepare and e-file tax returns.



HELP WANTED: SYNOD ASSEMBLY "VOTING MEMBER"



The next assembly (convention) of the Florida-Bahamas Synod will be June 8 to June 10 at the Caribe Royale resort and convention center near Orlando. Reformation needs a "voting member" (not a delegate voting on behalf of the congregation, but a faithful member who will vote their own conscience).

Reformation will pay for the hotel room, and you are allowed to share it with a spouse or other guest (Pastor Lois will

probably bring her husband again; last year, he relaxed in their room and outside by the pool while she was busy). You are generally responsible for your own meals, but there is a refrigerator and a microwave in each room, so bringing some food and drinks with you is certainly an option (Pastor Lois and her husband did that last year). Maybe you can get Pastor Lois and her husband to treat you and your guest to one meal at the resort? Maybe you can meet-up and share a meal with friends who belong to other ELCA congregations?

This year, we will be electing or re-electing our synod bishop. The full agenda has not been released, but typically includes opening and closing worship (great preaching, wonderful singing, and communion), recognition of ordination and congregation anniversaries, a keynote speaker, breakout sessions (workshops on various topics), video and spoken reports on synod and churchwide efforts, and (similar to a congregation's annual meeting) voting on the proposed (synod) budget and (synod) council positions. Pastor Lois will arrive a day early for First Call Theological Education workshops.

LET'S INVEST IN AN OUTCOME!

As I say each month, "Giving to church is an investment in an outcome", not just paying the electric bill. Yes, we do need to pay the electric bill but by so doing we are able to provide worship both in-person and online, furnish services to our community, like packing lunches for the homeless, collecting school supplies, providing Christmas for foster kids, and above all, receiving the spiritual health and blessings we all need.

When the 2022 Spending Plan was approved, I projected that we would have a financial shortfall for the year of approximately \$52,000. Like all of us, Reformation has felt the increased costs of everything. I am happy to report that we ended 2022


with a shortfall of \$10,670, thanks to generous giving and controlled spending.



Soon you will be hearing more about a "wish list" for those items that would be nice to have but not a necessity, i.e. hearing aid assistance sound system, a solution for the sun that shines brightly on Sunday mornings through the windows at the front of the church and into the eyes of the organist and some worshippers, depending on where they sit. The cost for these items on the wish list

are not included in the budget but can be covered by special donations or gifts.

At the annual congregational meeting in December, the 2023 Spending Plan was approved as proposed. Projected income for 2023 is \$133,521; projected expenses are \$191,832. Each donated dollar will go to support the following missions:





The 2022 Financials audit should be completed by the end of March. We are looking for three (3) voting members to be on the audit team. You do not need to be a financial whiz to audit the books. If you can balance your checkbook, you can be on the team. The audit usually takes

4-6 hours, less if no errors are found. You look at the treasurer's records as well as the financial secretary's records. Some of the information is CONFIDENTIAL. Contact Karen Hamilton or Vickey Zelazny if you would like to be on the audit team.

TIME, TALENT, AND TREASURE

We must continue to cultivate all three T's to continue growing as stewards of the abundance that God has given us as individuals and as a congregation!

TIME TIPS - Even if health or other circumstances make it impossible for you to offer any "talent" to the congregation, you can certainly devote "time with God" in worship and through prayer!

- Worship with your congregation every possible Sunday. A Facebook video ("Live" or recorded) is available when in-person participation is not possible.
- Remember to "say grace" (pray before eating). Doing so when with a group or at a restaurant is also an effortless way to publicly express your faith.
- Get ready to spend "quality time" with God on Wednesdays during Lent! Put these 4 p.m. dates on your calendar now: February 22 (Ash Wednesday) and March 1, 8, 15, 22, and 29.

TALENT TIPS – Sometimes the only "talent for God" you need to offer is dependability or a willingness to try something new. Here are some options:

- Are you already volunteering for a non-profit other than Reformation? Keep doing it "for the greater glory of God" while wearing your "God's Work" shirt or other Christian swag.
- Regularly re-evaluate your participation options at Reformation by checking the sign-up clipboards and binders in the narthex (church lobby).
- Find one hour a week in your current schedule to "give up" for Lent, and replace it with something helpful to the church, such as serving as the office volunteer one Thursday morning.

TREASURE TIPS – Consider "thinking outside the box" in addition to continuing the "treasure to God" that you regularly provide. For example:

- Find one weekly purchasing habit to "give up" for Lent (such as one meal out or one basket of range balls) and use the funds to increase your offering or participate in an outreach project.
- Do you have an Amazon, hardware store, grocery, or gas station gift card that you will never use? Donate it to Reformation for committee purchases or for regifting to a family in need.
- Help the congregation be a better steward of the property in its care. For example, refer an HOA or other compatible organization that will make a donation in return for a place to meet.

LUTHERANISM 101: ANOINTING

"Are any among you sick?

They should call for the elders of the church and have them pray over them, anointing them with oil in the name of the Lord."

- James 5:14

Last month, our "Lutheran 101" article discussed baptism. In addition to being baptized with water (three splashes or sprinkles, or a full emersion "dunking") and words specified by Jesus in the Bible ("in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit"), baptism in the Lutheran tradition typically involves the use of fragrant oil. The presiding minister uses this oil to mark or anoint the newly-baptized person with the sign of the cross.

In the Bible, fragrant oil is king to anoint them as being set-apart addition to baptism, anointing may be that they are "sealed by the Holy Spirit" (a recognized as a beloved child of God of Christ). This is usually done in person, such as thanking God for the their faith while using fragrant oil to

When you -- or someone you love – is interested in being anointed, please contact Pastor Lois for assistance. She keeps a small container of fragrant oil with her hospital badge and prayer book in her purse so that she is ready whenever the need arises.

WHAT ARE LENTEN OFFERINGS? WHERE DOES THAT MONEY GO?



The contributions you give in your Ash Wednesday and Lenten Offering envelopes do not go into the general fund. This money is currently designated to go to Grace Lutheran Church to help provide food for the **kidsPACK** program.

There are disadvantaged children all around us that go hungry every day. While subsidized school breakfast and lunch programs are in place during school hours, what happens at mealtime for these very same children evenings, weekends and over the summer months?

kidsPACK strives to bridge that gap by simply taking action.

Begun in Polk County in 2011, with a mission to help make sure that no child goes hungry, **kidsPACK** is a non-profit organization supported by local community leaders and volunteers. Today, the project in Polk County alone, feeds children in 70 different schools.

An everyday backpack is turned into a food transportation module stocked with nutritious, child-friendly and easy to prepare food for children to eat over the weekend and times when they are away from school. We pack non-perishable containerized items like ravioli, fruit cups, trail mix and portable snacks like granola bars and pop-tarts.

Grace Lutheran Church provides backpacks for 30 kids in Polk County at the approximate cost of \$600 per month. In order to support this worthwhile project, we assist by sending our Lenten Offerings to Grace to help purchase the food they need.

PROVIDE A BAG LUNCH

On the third Sunday of each month we pack lunches for our homeless neighbors and their doggie companions, a "God's Work, Our Hands" project started in 2021. Last month we had 3 new volunteers. Why don't you plan to join us this month? It takes less than 30 minutes following worship. *With just a*



\$5 monthly donation from each household, we are able to pack 20-25 lunches per month. We need donations of both dry and canned dog food (must have pull tab openings) as well as treats. We also collect travel size personal care items to be distributed as needed.

It takes just 8 people, either male or female, to help on February19th following worship. The sign up sheet is on the credenza in the narthex.

HELP WANTED: "FISHERS OF PEOPLE"



- ✓ **External Communication** (critique existing efforts, post and share pictures and other material on social media, identify other means of reaching select neighborhoods or special demographics, and help our pastor update and expand Reformation's website)
- ✓ **Un(der)Churched Engagement** (invite repeat visitors to coffee hour and other congregation activities, provide church representation at community events, work with Reformation's standing committees to capitalize on evangelizing aspects of their events, and help our pastor establish a connection with Florida Polytechnic University).




