Their lead pastor is Juan Carlos Molina. He and his Spanishspeaking congregation are here Sunday afternoons, some Wednesday evenings, and occasional special events. They donate \$400/month to Reformation, which helps with utilities and maintenance of our facilities.

collecting and counting food for Talbot House Ministries.




experience here at Reformation. All interested people are invited to join.


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CROSS VS. CRUCIFIX (LUTHERANISM 101 – PART 1 OF 3)

Having a crucifix in the church sanctuary (worship space) is strictly a Roman Catholic thing, right? Nope. Lutheran, Episcopalian, and other Protestant churches might have a crucifix (cross with an image of the crucified Jesus), an "empty" cross, or both.



A Lutheran congregation's worship space is more likely to feature a crucifix as predominant wall art, in a stained-glass window, or on a pole (for processing in and out of the space) if it has an older building, especially if its charter members



were recent immigrants from countries where they were persecuted or experienced other hardships. Why? There can be great comfort in having a visual reminder that Jesus understands what it means to suffer.

In newer buildings (or sanctuaries that have undergone recent renovation), an "empty" cross is

more common. It can be a resurrection (death on the

powerful visual reminder of the victory of Easter cross did not "win").

Some congregations even feature a "risen Christ"

Have you ever considered being a member of the congregation council at Reformation? It is a very important position. Think about it — we need to fill two vacancies for 2024.


PRAYER ROOM OR PRAYER ZOOM?

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COMING SOON: "NEW AND IMPROVED" WEBSITE

"TOWN HALL" FEEDBACK: At our "Town Hall" meeting immediately after worship on July 30, we looked at some different website options (a mix of templates and actual sites) and discussed possibilities. Those present



acknowledged that a church's website is its "new front door" to visitors: they "drive by" before they decide whether to visit, and ours needs more "curb appeal" as well as functionality. We should have more visual content (actual pictures and short videos, not just stock photos), organize content for ease of use, and look into adding a secure "members only" area for useful-to-us items like the church directory.

NEXT STEP: Watch for an eblast in the next week or so that contains a comparison of website platforms currently under consideration. This is taking longer to prepare than originally discussed during the meeting because, based on the feedback received, we have been looking into some additional options.

OBJECTIVE: We want to transition to a new website by mid-October. Although we will initially focus on better demonstrating "who we are" (a congregation of big-hearted older adults who appreciate Lutheran liturgy), we also want to project a forward-thinking perspective and have the technological capacity to adapt and add content needed to serve others who are looking for a faith community (starting with, but not exclusive to, still-working and recently-retired "younger" older adults).

"MAKING" THE CROSS (LUTHERANISM 101 – PART 2 OF 3)

"Making" the cross (the sign of the cross, with or without water, on your head and/or chest) is strictly a Roman Catholic thing, right? Nope.



Lutherans and others also like to "remember" our baptism. In fact, in many congregations, First Communion candidates are encouraged to "remember" their baptism by making the sign of the cross whenever they are using water, such as brushing their teeth. This is also why Reformation's sanctuary (worship space) design strategically located the baptismal font by the doors we use to enter the space, and why we moved it back to that location after Pastor Lois arrived.

During the Easter season this year, we removed the font's lid and added water to reinforce that visual reminder of baptism. You liked it! In fact, some of you are now in the habit of using that water to "remember" your baptism in the name of the Father, and the Son, and the Holy Spirit. Go for it!

DO JUSTICE! (A SHORT POLL NEEDING YOUR INPUT)

He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the LORD require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God? - Micah 6:8

Reformation's community outreach efforts currently consist of "mercy" (food drives and other ways in which we demonstrate love and kindness by generously addressing immediate needs). But what about "justice" (awareness, advocacy, and other efforts to address the underlying causes of such needs)? Our constitution says that our congregation's purpose (in addition to worshiping God, proclaiming the Gospel, and carrying out the Great Commission) includes "advocating dignity and justice of all people, working for peace and reconciliation among the nations, and standing with the poor and powerless" (C4.02.d). That's a pretty tall order!

Based on our recent "mercy" projects, "Town Hall" discussions, local interfaith issues, Florida-Bahama Synod involvement, and ELCA priorities, we have developed a list of "some" local and societal concerns that may be of interest. 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2023 FLA-BAHAMAS SYNOD ASSEMBLY

Each year we ask for a volunteer to attend the Fla-Bahamas Synod Assembly as a voting delegate for Reformation. Jim Williams was our delegate for the 2023 Assembly. Below is his report. It is well worth your reading. Maybe next year you will consider being our delegate.

I attended the 2023 Florida-Bahamas Synod Assembly earlier this year. The three-day event took place in Orlando on June 8, 9 and 10 with Pastor Sorensen and me representing Reformation Lutheran Church.

The assembly was the first synod-wide event I had ever attended. Because of this, the scope of my understanding of the Lutheran church was limited to attending services at my home church. Armed with my limited experience and having studied the assembly's schedule of events I arrived in Orlando, checked-in to the hotel and made my way to the convention center. The convention center was bustling with activity as people made their way to various venues. I was relieved when I quickly found Pastor Sorensen who had saved seats for us in the main meeting room. Once we were seated and the meetings got underway, I began to appreciate the magnitude of the assembly. The meeting room was huge and filled with approximately 400 Lutherans. This was by far the largest group of Lutherans I had ever been with at one time. There were reunions with old friends and introductions to new ones. Music and singing were integral parts of the proceedings. Hearing 400 Lutherans singing hymns in unison was a moving experience and one that I will not soon forget.

During the three days of the assembly, we heard from people who are spearheading efforts throughout the synod to further the work of the church in ministry and community outreach. I had no idea of the extent to which churches in our synod have a positive effect on our communities. Among those who spoke at the assembly were Bishop Suarez of our synod and Bishop Davenport of the Southeast Pennsylvania Synod. Their eloquence and leadership made it easy to understand how they came to hold positions as leaders of their respective synods.

I think one of the most important things I learned at the assembly is that the success of the synod depends on the work and dedication of its churches, and the success of each church depends on the efforts of its members. It made me feel good to hear Reformation Lutheran Church being recognized several times for our contributions to the synod's mission.

Attending the synod assembly was a positive experience for me and exceeded my expectations.

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AUGUST'S SPOTLIGHT ON A VOLUNTEER

This month we meander down the road a ways to Sue Bleacher's beautiful home. Sue has been a Sandpiper resident for 24 years!

She was raised by foster parents on a dairy farm in Lancaster County, PA, along with her two brothers. Right out of High School she married her High School sweetheart and gave birth to three boys, Harry, Kevin, and Dewey (not all at once). She is the reason childbirth is called "labor" because her boys were nearly 10 pounds (one was over 10 pounds!) Yeah, ouch. Sue is a petite woman, so to imagine her having those huge babies is amazing!

For ten years she worked driving a school bus, which she loved. The only problem was they had to strap blocks onto the pedals because her legs couldn't reach! (I'm not kidding). But she overcame that obstacle just as she did everything else in her life. She may be small (and she is), but she's quite the

dynamo!

After her children were older, she went to work full-time for Exide Batteries, which produced plastic parts for batteries in cars, trucks, motorcycles, etc. It was during this time that she and her husband divorced.

Then the funniest thing happened. Her foster brother married a gal who had a brother that lived in New Jersey who would often come to visit. Bob and Sue had known each other since they were nine years old. One day, Bob's sister told him to ask Sue out--and the rest is history!

Sue married her true love in 1989 and moved to New Jersey where Bob and his four children lived. Sue decided she might as well retire when she moved and Bob retired not long after. Then, like so many people, they decided they were sick and tired of winter and moved to Florida – right into Sandpiper!

It wasn't long before Sue and Bob became involved in all that Sandpiper has to offer. She was reluctantly talked into driving a CAP car, making it quite clear if she didn't like it she wouldn't continue doing it. That was 14 years ago! She and Bob would keep our streets safe together. She has also delivered the Newspiper for 12 years. Every Wednesday night for 15 years she was at Bingo until she lost the love of her life five years ago. But, Sue still drives the CAP car five days a week with the memory of her soul mate sitting shotgun next to her. She was given a Certificate of Achievement from Sheriff Grady Judd himself, recognizing 560 hours of volunteer hours in 2022

She has also competed in the Senior Olympics for 12 years, primarily in tennis and bowling. She is an avid (and a very good) bowler who finds herself at the alleys twice a week. In the past, she's helped in the kitchen with Connie Farmer for Thanksgivings, Christmases, and Pancake breakfasts.

When she's not in the CAP car or rolling strikes at the bowling alley (seriously, it's really annoying when you're playing against her), she enjoys trips on the gambling boat that Birdie Lycans puts together.

She is also a breast cancer survivor, and just a survivor period. If you're out between 6:00 AM and 8:00 AM Monday through Friday, and see the CAP car drive by, give her a wave. 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Sunday, September 10th, we will celebrate the 10th anniversary of "God's Work Our Hands" (GWOH), the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) nationwide day of service. This day is an opportunity to celebrate who we are as the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America – one church, freed in Christ to serve and love our neighbor.

Service activities offer an opportunity for us to explore one of our most basic convictions as Lutherans: that all of

life in Jesus Christ – every act of service, in every daily calling, in every corner of life – flows freely from a living, daring confidence in God's grace.

Reformation will have two service projects: one will be to write thank you notes to the teaching staff and paraprofessionals at Padgett Elementary School, the second will be to put together packages of laundry products to wash/dry a triple-load of clothes to be distributed to the local "working poor" and unsheltered (homeless) people.

It's not too late to donate your quarters and laundry soap pods. Bring them on the 10th.

Be sure to wear your GWOH t-shirt and plan to come to coffee hour following worship on the 10th to complete the projects as well as enjoy coffee and fellowship.

DID YOU KNOW?

INSTRUCTIONS

Praise & Pinch Feedback System

This method of feedback deals with joys, concerns, feelings, and opinions you may have about what is (or is not) happening at Reformation. It provides opportunity for you to communicate about ways we are doing well in our ministry together and areas that might need attention. Such input and feedback helps us all to be faithful in carrying out our mission.

Here's how the system works:

- 1. There is a confidential box in the narthex for receiving "Praise & Pinch" forms. Copies of these forms (instructions on one side, blanks to complete on the other side) are kept near the box.
- 2. Write out your praise(s) or pinch(es) on the form, sign it, and place it in the Praise & Pinch Box.
- 3. Forms will be collected by a member of the "Praise & Pinch" Committee.
- 4. You will be contacted to let you know that your form has been received and to clarify with you the content of your input and what you would like to see happen.
- 5. Following this conversation (#3 & #4 above), you will then be told how your message will be handled.
- 6. Your message will be delivered to the appropriate committee, subgroup, or person. Follow-through will include communicating to you the final outcome of your feedback.

Throughout this process, **confidentiality** will be maintained.
