2024 STEWARDSHIP CAMPAIGN

We are up about 19% for 2024!

Every October, we ask members and friends to signal their "intent" to financially support the congregation's ministries for the following year. This annual giving campaign is only one aspect of our ongoing time, talent, and treasure stewardship efforts.

Although we did not achieve 100% participation (return of every "intent card" that was distributed), the total amount that people plan to provide in 2024 is up about 19% compared to 2023. A few individuals or couples had to lower their expected giving due to changes in their circumstances, but new members and existing members who did not participate last year really came through!

Whether you do a once-a-year distribution or weekly contribution, the "treasure to God" you entrust to the congregation is greatly appreciated.



ONE WORSHIP SERVICE ON DECEMBER 24TH (KIND OF)

Did you notice something on the "Dates & Events" page of the weekly worship bulletin? Yvonne Mueller also mentioned it in a recent announcement!

December 24th falls on a Sunday this year. Instead of having a normal "Advent 4" service at 10 a.m., redecorating the sanctuary, and then celebrating "Christmas Eve" during a second service at 4 p.m., Reformation will offer a combined service at 10 a.m.

This is intended as a gift to our dedicated Worship & Music volunteers and everyone else in the congregation. The altar guild (decoration set-up and communion clean-up people), assisting minister, choir members, reader, usher, videographer, and others will not be expected to do double or triple duty on a holy day. Everyone can come to church for communion (and cookies) in morning, then enjoy the evening with their friends, family, or favorite Christmas movie.

them. See you on the 21st!!



The devotion on Wednesday is normally "live" at 12 Noon.





ADDITIONAL YEAR-END STEWARDSHIP ("TIME WITH GOD" TIPS)

- Remember to watch Reformation's lectionary-based devotions (videos posted on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday each week on our Facebook page).
- Spend some time listening to sacred (not Santa) music or the sounds of nature (whether outside your back door or at a local wilderness preserve).
- Stop by during Pastor's scheduled office hours to pray or meditate in the sanctuary (you might also be treated to the sounds of Elise practicing on the organ or piano).



LUTHERANISM 101 THE ADVENT WREATH

The custom of the Advent wreath originated in Germany in the 16th century to serve as a visual reminder of the four weeks of Advent in our liturgical calendar. First found in Lutheran homes, the custom later spread to public worship and other Christian denominations.

In its most traditional form, the Advent wreath is a circle made of evergreen boughs and adorned with four candles. The circular shape

represents God's infinite love, and the use of evergreen represents the promise of eternal life through Jesus Christ.

The colors of the four candles can vary. Lutherans currently tend to use blue. Roman Catholics tend to use purple, a penitential color in keeping with the original tone of the Advent season. Anglicans might use red.

On a Lutheran or Roman Catholic wreath, one of the candles might be pink (more on that in a moment). Sometimes a fifth candle is added to the middle of the wreath (more on that in a moment, too). Eastern Orthodox Christians often use a total of six candles, each one a different color.

On a four-candle wreath, the first candle is named and lit on the First Sunday of Advent. Each week, an additional candle is named and lit. A Bible reading, prayer, or song might accompany each lighting.

The names associated with the four candles can vary. They typically represent the Christian concepts of hope, peace, joy, and love (often in that order). The "hope" candle is sometimes called the "Prophesy" candle. The "joy" candle is the one that might be pink (technically, rose), and an alternative name for it is the "Gaudete" candle (from the Latin word meaning "rejoice").

When a fifth candle is added, it is white and called the "Christ" or "Pascal" candle. It not lit until Christmas Eve or Christmas Day, heralding the birth of Jesus.

CONGREGATIONAL MEETING

(PART 2): WHY?



On the "Dates & Events" page of the weekly worship bulletin, you may have noticed "Congregational Meeting (Part 1)" occurring on December 10. This is the constitutionally-required annual meeting in which voting members need to discuss (and hopefully approve) the 2024 budget.

"Part 1" implies a "Part 2" will also occur. It has been scheduled for January 14.

At a minimum, we will have lay leadership positions to vote on at that time. For our congregational council, we knew we were going to have up to three 3-year terms available. Due to recent resignations (both for valid reasons), we will also have one 2-year term and one 1-year term available. For synod assembly, which meets in early June, we are allowed one voting member in addition to our rostered ministers (Pastor Lois and retired pastors who are members of the congregation).

These positions will be explained during the "Part 1" meeting. Nomination forms will be available for you to offer your own talents (knowledge, skill, experience, and/or "gumption") or to nominate someone else. If you are already thinking about someone who would be a viable candidate, please contact any council member or e-mail lovinglutherans@gmail.com.

Raise the Roof" campaign former property manager, the replacement of the roof office wing which was then some estimates for 2018 and found that the

costs at that time were \$60,000 for shingles and \$120,000 for metal. If you have had your roof replaced recently, you have an idea at what those prices are today! Doug projected that we would need a roof replacement in 4-5 years. We asked each household to add \$5 a week to their giving and designate it for the roof fund. If everyone did that, we would have \$60,000 in 4 years. At the end of October 2023, our roof fund stands at \$45,542. We have been fortunate that any storm impact has been minor but we are pushing our luck. We have a few shingles missing. Are we going to have to take out a loan to replace the roof? We don't want problems with our insurance because of the condition of the roof. I know times are tight for many of us living on fixed incomes, but anything you can give towards this future expense will be greatly appreciated.

GIVING WHEN IT COUNTS

Many years ago, when I worked as a volunteer at a hospital, I got to know a little girl named Liz who was suffering from a rare & serious disease. Her only chance of recovery appeared to be a blood transfusion from her 5-year old brother, who had miraculously survived the same disease and had developed the antibodies needed to combat the illness. The doctor explained the situation to her little brother, and asked the little boy if he would be willing to give his blood to his sister.

I saw him hesitate for only a moment before taking a deep breath and saying, "Yes I'll do it if it will save her." As the transfusion progressed, he lay in bed next to his sister and smiled, as we all did, seeing the color returning to her cheek. Then his face grew pale and his smile faded.

He looked up at the doctor and asked with a trembling voice, "Will I start to die right away". Being young, the little boy had misunderstood the doctor: he thought he was going to have to give his sister all of his blood in order to save her.

Remember – "Live with no regrets, treat people the way you want to be treated, work like you don't need the money, love like you've never been hurt, and dance like you do when nobody's watching."



INSTRUCTIONS

Praise & Pinch Feedback System

This method of feedback deals with joys, concerns, feelings, and opinions you may have about what is (or is not) happening at Reformation. It provides opportunity for you to communicate about ways we are doing well in our ministry together and areas that might need attention. Such input and feedback helps us all to be faithful in carrying out our mission.

Here's how the system works:

- 1. There is a confidential box in the narthex for receiving "Praise & Pinch" forms. Copies of these forms (instructions on one side, blanks to complete on the other side) are kept near the box.
- 2. Write out your praise(s) or pinch(es) on the form, sign it, and place it in the Praise & Pinch Box.
- 3. Forms will be collected by a member of the "Praise & Pinch" Committee.
- 4. You will be contacted to let you know that your form has been received and to clarify with you the content of your input and what you would like to see happen.
- 5. Following this conversation (#3 & #4 above), you will then be told how your message will be handled.
- 6. Your message will be delivered to the appropriate committee, subgroup, or person. Follow-through will include communicating to you the final outcome of your feedback.

Throughout this process, **confidentiality** will be maintained.



THE VIVA-MIND CLINICAL RESEARCH TRIAL IS FOR PEOPLE WITH MEMORY IMPAIRMENT AND EARLY ALZHEIMER'S DISEASE

Do you know someone who may be a good fit for VIVA-MIND?



The VIVA-MIND clinical trial is taking place at three specialty clinics in San Diego county. VIVA-MIND is testing a drug aimed at slowing down memory and thinking problems that increase as Mild Cognitive Impairment and early Alzheimer's disease progress.

The study drug (varoglutamstat) targets N3pE, a toxic protein that appears to damage brain cells and is not found in healthy brains.

Eligibility:

- Women and men age 50-89
- Diagnosis of mild cognitive impairment or early Alzheimer's disease
