Dear Reformation Nation,

give yourself the same grace that God
offers you, and (re)start for the month

As I write this message and compose other contributions for the newsletter, I am wondering (again) about the mission statement of the congregation ("Growing in faith and love through Jesus Christ"). I see the growth in love, especially as expressed by generosity to VISTE, Talbot House, and our other local ministry partners. It would absolutely thrill me if you helped me identify and implement ideas to support the growth of faith within this congregation.

As always, please pray that our ongoing and future endeavors are always guided by faithful discernment of this question: "What is God up to here?"

## WHAT ARE LENTEN OFFERINGS? WHERE DOES THAT MONEY GO?



The contributions you give in your Ash Wednesday and Lenten Offering envelopes do not go into our general fund. This money is designated to go to Grace Lutheran Church to help provide food for the **kidsPACK** program.

There are disadvantaged children all around us that go hungry every day. While subsidized school breakfast and lunch programs are in place during school hours, what happens at mealtime for these very same children evenings, weekends and over the summer months?

kidsPACK strives to bridge that gap by simply taking action.

Begun in Polk County in 2011, with a mission to help make sure that no child goes hungry, **kidsPACK** is a non-profit organization supported by local community leaders and volunteers. Today, the project in Polk County alone, feeds children in 70 different schools.

An everyday backpack is turned into a food transportation module stocked with nutritious, child-friendly and easy to prepare food for children to eat over the weekend and times when they are away from school. We pack non-perishable containerized items like ravioli, fruit cups, trail mix and portable snacks like granola bars and pop-tarts.

Grace Lutheran Church provides backpacks for 30 kids in Polk County at the cost of over \$600 per month. In order to support this worthwhile project, we assist by sending our Lenten Offerings to Grace to help purchase the food they need.

"Bonus" Lutheranism 101: Clapping in Church




Some of us were raised to "never" applaud in church. The theological basis is this: the primary purpose of worship to glorify God; whereas, if we clap after a piece of music, we are glorifying the musicians instead of God.

Here is another way of looking at it: when we clap, we are thanking the musicians for sharing a special talent that they are using to glorify God. Amen?

It would be extreme to interrupt the flow of worship by applauding after every element of every service (instrumental piece, sung music, reading, etc.). However, if you occasionally feel like offering a special thankyou for a special effort, Pastor Lois says it is OK with her if you want to clap. She also says she would not frown on an occasional "Amen" or other affirmation if something she says while preaching really moves you.

### FINANCIAL STEWARDSHIP: MEMORIAL GIFTS AND LEGACY GIVING

Memorial Gifts and Legacy Giving are two aspects of "treasure to God" stewardship that people are hesitant to talk about. But we ought to talk (or at least write) about it.

MEMORIAL GIFTS - When there is a funeral or memorial service at Reformation, we make sure "Memorial Gift" envelopes are available in the narthex (lobby) for participants to use. Unless a donor specifies a particular use, the monetary gifts received in those envelopes are combined with any other memorial donations that are mailed to the church or made online. The deceased person's family is then contacted to decide how to use the combined amount. Reformation maintains a "wish list" of requested items (including contributions to an endowment fund) that can be helpful when it is time to make the decision. This same list can also be used by people wanting to direct their own donation, whether in memory of someone who died, in honor of a special person or life event, or to share a portion of a financial windfall.

LEGACY GIVING – Speaking of a financial windfall, have \*you\* considered making a special gift to the congregation when you are "promoted to glory" (die)? It can be as simple as adding Reformation as one of the beneficiaries of a life insurance policy (for example, at least one member has arranged for ten percent of a life insurance policy to go to the church instead of their family). It can be as complicated as allocating a specific item from your estate. If you are considering "leaving something" other than an unrestricted financial gift, please make sure it is on the "wish list" (which includes contributions to an endowment fund) or contact the stewardship committee ahead of making any legal arrangements, so that the congregation can either be ready to receive it or has an opportunity to offer an alternative suggestion.

P.S. – Did you see the article in last month's newsletter in which we asked you to increase your regular offering by \$6.51 a week (less than a dollar a day), compared to the "intent card" you filled-out for 2024? If you have not done so yet, please consider setting up a reoccurring donation for that amount from our giving page, which will also give you a chance to see how easy it is to use Vanco online giving! 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### WHAT IS OUR MISSION AND PURPOSE?

We started this conversation once before. Let's really think about it for the next few months. Reformation's published mission statement is this:

#### "Growing in faith and love through Jesus Christ"

A congregation should update its mission statement every 5-7 years to make sure the words still reflect and guide how it functions. Here are three pieces of information to take into consideration:



- 1. The "Great Commission" (Matthew 28:19). Jesus says, "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you.
- 2. The "Greatest Commandments" (Matthew 22:37-39). Jesus says, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the greatest and first commandment. And a second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself."
- 3. Our statement of purpose, as codified in our constitution (C4.01 & C4.02, including changes to C4.02 approved during our January 14,2024 congregational meeting):

The Church is a people created by God in Christ, empowered by the Holy Spirit, called and sent to bear witness to God's creative, redeeming, and sanctifying activity in the world.

To participate in God's mission, this congregation as a part of the Church shall:

- a. Worship God in proclamation of the Word and administration of the sacraments and through lives of prayer, praise, thanksgiving, witness, and service.
- b. Proclaim God's saving Gospel of justification by grace for Christ's sake through faith alone, according to the apostolic witness in the Holy Scripture, preserving and transmitting the Gospel faithfully to future generations.
- c. Carry out Christ's Great Commission by reaching out to all people to bring them to faith in Christ and by doing all ministry with a global awareness consistent with the understanding of God as Creator, Redeemer, and Sanctifier of all.
- d. Serve in response to God's love to meet human needs, caring for the sick and the aged, advocating dignity, justice, and equity for all people, working for peace and reconciliation among the nations, caring for the marginalized, embracing and welcoming racially and ethnically diverse populations, and standing in solidarity with the poor and oppressed and committing itself to their needs.
- e. Nurture its members in the Word of God so as to grow in faith and hope and love, to see daily life as the primary setting for the exercise of their Christian calling, and to use the gifts of the Spirit for their life together and for their calling in the world.
- f. Manifest the unity given to the people of God by living together in the love of Christ and by joining with other Christians in prayer and action to express and preserve the unity which the Spirit gives.

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## TIME STEWARDSHIP



Followers of Jesus practice the "3 T's" of stewardship: time with God, talent for God, and treasure to God. Time with God is not limited to showing up for about an hour a week to worship God with other followers of Jesus. It also involves making a daily effort, usually in the form of at least 15 to 20 minutes of prayer.

If your prayers usually involve talking to God, try listening for God (spending time in a garden, at a park, or on a beach might help). If your prayers usually involve listening for God, try talking to God (it can even take the form of singing or a spontaneous conversation).

Talking to God? Here are some suggested prayer topics for March:

- Continue to offer prayers for VISTE and kidsPACK, the local recipients of our Lenten outreach projects. Ask God to bless the efforts of both organizations, both directly and through generous donations from the members and friends of Reformation.
- Pray for the un(der) churched in our area. Ask God to send them our way, whether they "Google" for a church to visit or are personally invited to join us during Holy Week.
- Offer a prayer of discernment for all members of the congregation. Ask God to move someone to volunteer to serve as our "voting member" at Synod Assembly (5/30-6/1) and move more people to serve in other roles within the congregation. Be sure to listen for God to call your name!
- Pray for a different person each day on long-term concern list (a copy of which is on the last page of most worship bulletins). Ask God to address their concerns, and then call them so they know they have been prayed-for.
- Offer a prayer of gratitude for everyone involved in planning and implementing worship this month. Ask God to grant them good health and "good courage" (especially for the special services during Holy Week).



## **LUTHERANISM 101: HOLY WEEK**

During Holy Week, we have three worship services that have very particular shapes: Palm Sunday (Passion Sunday), the Triduum (the Three Days), and Easter Sunday (Resurrection of Our Lord).

PALM SUNDAY: There are typically two gospel readings on this day. The first one is used to start worship along with a blessing of palm fronds and a procession in remembrance of Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem. In a sad concession to poor attendance on Good Friday, the other gospel reading is one of the passion narratives, a long reading which goes into detail regarding the arrest, torture, and death of Jesus. Signifying the passion, the color of the day may be red instead of purple.



TRIDUUM: The middle worship service of Holy Week takes place over two or three days (kind of like how a funeral technically starts at the church or funeral home and ends at the gravesite or columbarium). The full "Three Days" (the church's official name for this service) consists of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Easter Vigil.

MAUNDY THURSDAY: On this day, we hear about the "last supper" (the sharing of bread and wine that occurred the night before Jesus died on the cross), which is when Jesus instituted the sacrament we know as communion. In addition to sharing bread and wine, Jesus issued a new mandate (in Latin, mandatum, which is where "Maundy" comes from) to his disciples: love one another as he

loved them. Jesus demonstrated that love by washing their feet (something that normally would be done by only the lowliest of servants). Our modern variation is to offer optional hand washing. The day ends with "stripping of the altar" (removal of everything from the altar and its general vicinity) to represent the abandonment of Jesus that began as soon as the supper ended.

GOOD FRIDAY: On this day, the altar remains "stripped" and we hear the passion narrative found in the Holy Gospel according to John. The rest of the named disciples, even Peter, abandon Jesus as he suffers and dies. Some of the women remain, and two other early believers ask to take care of the body. In lieu of a second sermon, God speaks to us through the Solemn Reproaches. In lieu of regular "prayers of the people" we answer through the Bidding Prayers. The day ends with psalmody and sound associated with the tomb being closed.

TRIDUUM

EASTER VIGIL: Reformation's Holy Week tradition does not include an Easter Vigil. If we had one, it would be held the evening of Holy Saturday, starting outside with a bonfire or inside with the Pascal candle (the big candle that symbolizes Christ's presence). This "new light" of resurrection can be used to light smaller candles throughout the assembly (like some congregations do on Christmas Eve). Up to twelve (yes, 12!) readings are heard. After the readings and a sermon, baptisms and affirmations of baptism (confirmations) occur. A complete vigil can take three hours. The Easter "sunrise service" is a modern, abbreviated version of the ancient vigil.

EASTER SUNDAY: Easter Sunday is the "Sunday of all Sundays." It is a "normal" Sunday worship service in terms of format (the four-part rhythm of gather, Word, Meal, and send). The service as a whole is designed to be more joyous than normal in many ways, including: lilies or other live flowers, white and/or gold items, a lit Pascal candle, a celebratory "thanksgiving for baptism" (instead of the typical "confession and forgiveness" rite), plenty of music (greater quantity, higher quality, and/or more musicians), and return of the "Alleluia" (absent from the liturgy and hymns and during Lent). In some congregations, "Meal" (communion) is enhanced by use of a special wine or bread.

# RETREAT AT REFORMATION? SYNOD PARISH DEACONS



Reformation will be hosting the Florida-Bahamas Synod's annual retreat for Synod Parish Deacons (SPDs) on April 19 (4 p.m. – 9 p.m.) and April 20 (8 a.m. to 2 p.m.). The theme this year is "Refresh and Renew" and the event is open to current and prospective SPDs as well as their pastors.

What's an SPD? A layperson with a combination of "some" theological training (such as

our synod's School of Lay Ministry, formerly known as diakonia Florida) and practical experience (hands-on training gained by volunteering within a congregation) who serves as a deacon for that congregation under the general oversight of their pastor. Pastor Lois served as an SPD before realizing she was called to ordained ministry, so ask her if you want more information.

What's going to happen during the retreat? Worship, including the affirmation of everyone's baptism. Education, including speakers and a panel discussion about the future of congregational ministry. Fun, including ice-breaker activities and fellowship during meals.

What's this got to do with me? Maybe you would like to help us host the event (take a two-hour shift as a "go-fer" – watch for a sign-up sheet in the narthex). If you are active in the congregation and feel called to collaborate in ministry with your pastor in a way other than serving on council, maybe you would rather attend the whole thing (talk to Pastor Lois and then pay a \$65 registration fee).



The sheet is in the narthex to sign up for an Easter Lily. The price this year is \$12.00. Please put your name, how many you want and who it is for. Place your money for the flowers in your offering envelope and mark it Easter Lily.



Volunteerism makes our worship service thrive. The greeters, ushers, lectors, camera operators, altar people and assisting ministers all do this. We need volunteers for Sundays. These are not hard jobs, and you only have to sign up for one Sunday at a time. We will train you and you don't have to work alone.

I want to thank all who have volunteered in the past, but our sheets have many empty spaces, so we need to have you sign up now. We all have hidden talents and there's no better time to use them than on Sunday morning to enhance our worship service. PLEASE sign up now to help out! 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## "DIVE IN" THE TALENT POOL!

Followers of Jesus practice the "3 T's" of stewardship: time with God, talent for God, and treasure to God.

Talent for God is not limited to gifted church soloists. "Catch" someone doing something you appreciate it, tell them so, and also report it (you can use the "praise" part of the "pinch and praise" forms in the narthex, or send an e-mail to <a href="lovinglutherans@gmail.com">lovinglutherans@gmail.com</a>). "Catch" the spirit of volunteering, and sign-up to try something yourself (notebooks and clipboard with options are also in the narthex).
