"TALENT SHOW" (ON CAMPUS)

Followers of Jesus practice the "3 T's" of stewardship: time with God, talent for God, and treasure to God.

Talent for God is not limited to gifted church soloists (although we certainly give thanks for those with gifts in that "department").

Maybe "talent" isn't even the right word to use, because doing something FOR God is often more of a matter of teach-

ability (eagerness to gain the needed knowledge) or tenacity (a confident willingness to attempt) than talent itself (innate ability).

With our "snowbirds" gone (or soon to be), we depend on year-round residents to "show up" over the summer months. Take a look at the clipboards and three-ring binders in the narthex to survey the wealth of in-person opportunities. Look at it this way: if you are concerned about doing something "new-to-you" well enough to give glory to God, lighter Sunday attendance provides a low-key (less stress) environment in which to learn. Besides, we are Lutheran, so there is "always" grace.

JUSTICE OUTREACH (PART 1 OF 2): INTERFAITH COALITION OF POLK COUNTY

You have probably already heard of the Interfaith Coalition of Polk County. An earlier version of the coalition folded several years ago, after the thenleader unexpectedly died; the current version came to life in December 2022, in response to a neo-Nazi group protesting at a local art gallery hosting a fundraising event that included a G-rated drag show.

The neo-Nazi group tried to disseminate divisive hate in the greater Lakeland area, showing up with anti-Jewish and anti-LGBTQ+ signs and slogans. Instead of division, their actions brought faith leaders together from various Christian, Jewish, Buddhist, and other religious traditions to re-form the coalition. Pastor Lois (from Reformation Lutheran Church) and Pastor Pam (from Grace Lutheran Church) have been among these faith leaders.

In response to the neo-Nazi protest, faith leaders first issued a joint statement (which some of you signed in January) denouncing the hate. Since then, they have met in each other's houses of worship to reconstitute the coalition and learn about each other's faith traditions. Some of them also spoke at last year's "Faith in Pride" interfaith service, provided a ministry of presence at the synagogue after the Israel-Palestine conflict began, and began planning coalition events.

Most recently, we were invited to the coalition's "Hands Across the Water" celebration of unity and diversity of faith. It was held on March 24 at the water dome on the campus of Florida Southern College (see pictures).





A "town hall" meeting is intended to be an informal listening session, giving leadership a chance to hear directly from other members and friends of the congregation.

We endeavor to hold these sessions once a quarter (on the fifth Sunday of each month that happens to have five Sundays). However, since the fifth Sunday in March happened to also be Easter Sunday, we scheduled it a week later than normal.

What questions, concerns, or dreams do vou have about **Reformation Lutheran** Church? We will discuss them right after Pastor Lois takes a few minutes to offer a special edition of the normal "first Sunday" **Reformation Information** session (see separate article for details). As time permits, leadership might also have some questions, concerns, or dreams to share with vou!

Meeting will be held in the fellowship hall, as usual.

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WHAT IS OUR MISSION AND PURPOSE?

We started this conversation once before. Let's really think about it for the next few months. Reformation's published mission statement is this:

"Growing in faith and love through Jesus Christ"

A congregation should update its mission statement every 5-7 years to make sure the words still reflect and guide how it functions. Here are three pieces of information to take into consideration:

- 1. The "Great Commission" (Matthew 28:19). Jesus says, "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you.
- 2. The "Greatest Commandments" (Matthew 22:37-39). Jesus says, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the greatest and first commandment. And a second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself."
- 3. Our statement of purpose, as codified in our constitution (C4.01 & C4.02, including changes to C4.02 approved during our January 14,2024 congregational meeting):

The Church is a people created by God in Christ, empowered by the Holy Spirit, called and sent to bear witness to God's creative, redeeming, and sanctifying activity in the world.

To participate in God's mission, this congregation as a part of the Church shall:

- a. Worship God in proclamation of the Word and administration of the sacraments and through lives of prayer, praise, thanksgiving, witness, and service.
- b. Proclaim God's saving Gospel of justification by grace for Christ's sake through faith alone, according to the apostolic witness in the Holy Scripture, preserving and transmitting the Gospel faithfully to future generations.
- c. Carry out Christ's Great Commission by reaching out to all people to bring them to faith in Christ and by doing all ministry with a global awareness consistent with the understanding of God as Creator, Redeemer, and Sanctifier of all.
- d. Serve in response to God's love to meet human needs, caring for the sick and the aged, advocating dignity, justice, and equity for all people, working for peace and reconciliation among the nations, caring for the marginalized, embracing and welcoming racially and ethnically diverse populations, and standing in solidarity with the poor and oppressed and committing itself to their needs.
- e. Nurture its members in the Word of God so as to grow in faith and hope and love, to see daily life as the primary setting for the exercise of their Christian calling, and to use the gifts of the Spirit for their life together and for their calling in the world.
- f. Manifest the unity given to the people of God by living together in the love of Christ and by joining with other Christians in prayer and action to express and preserve the unity which the Spirit gives.



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LUTHERANISM 101: EASTER (PART 1)

Easter. Pascha. Resurrection of Our Lord. Whatever you call it, the "Western" Church (including our denomination) celebrates "the" day on March 31 this year. Like Christmas, however, Easter is technically a season (not a single day); this is why you may hear people refer to Eastertide or Eastertime. We'll have more to say about the "season" in our May newsletter.

Although the commercialization of Christmas (and its intrusion into Advent) might lead you to think otherwise, Easter is considered "the" principal festival of the Church. The Church actually has three major festivals: Christmas, Easter, and Pentecost.



Why isn't Easter (the day) on a fixed date, like Christmas is always on December 25? The short answer is this: Easter "moves" to retain some semblance of the original relationship between Holy Week events and the Jewish calendar. Jesus made his final journey to Jerusalem when people were starting to arrive to celebrate Passover; this annual festival takes place on 15 Nisan (the 15th day after the first full moon after the spring equinox in northern hemisphere, which means the day of

the week varies from year to year). Jesus was crucified on the "day of preparation" (the day before the weekly Jewish sabbath, which starts at sunset on Friday) and Jesus was resurrected by dawn of "the first day" (the day after the Jewish sabbath; so, Sunday morning). Some early Christians celebrated Easter on 16 Nisan, regardless of what day of the week it was any particular year; however, others opted for a consistent "first day" celebration every year. By 325 CE, the "Western" Church decided that Easter should be observed on the first Sunday following the first full moon after the spring equinox.

Why do some people say Easter is a Christian appropriation of a pagan holiday? Part of the problem is the word "Easter" itself. Back in the 8th century, an Anglo-Saxon scholar (a monk named Bede) theorized that the word was derived from Eostre, the name of a pagan goddess of spring and fertility. However, modern scholars propose a more convoluted origin: the English word "Easter" comes from the German word "Ostern" which is derived from the Old High German "eostarum" which morphed over time from the phrase "in albis" (an ancient Latin name for the first week of Eastertide, which translates to English as the plural of "dawn" or "white"). Interestingly enough, though, "in albis" can mean "in the dark" in Spanish. Now you know why some churches now choose to call it Resurrection Sunday!

Each suite has a microwave and refrigerator, a breakfast buffet is offered downstairs, there are several restaurants nearby, and Pastor Lois and her husband will take you to dinner one of the two nights.

This will be a "workshop year" (less synod business, more time for breakout sessions on interesting topics). The keynote speaker will be Reverend Rafael Malpica – Padilla, who holds a B.A. in Philosophy from the University of Puerto Rico, a Master of Divinity degree from the Lutheran

Theological Seminary at Philadelphia (now part of United Lutheran Seminary), and several honorary Doctor of Divinity degrees.

Serving as the "voting member" means voting as needed on synod business, attending workshops of interest to you, and authoring (or being interviewed for) an article for the congregation's newsletter. JUSTICE OUTREACH (PART 2 OF 2): <u>POLK ECUMENICAL ACTION COUNCIL FOR EMPOWERMENT</u>



If you have heard about the Polk Ecumenical Action Council for Empowerment (PEACE), it was probably not through Reformation. The one exception might be if you closely read a recent newsletter article that used the organization's definition of justice. Here it is (referring, in part, to Micah 6:8 and Nehemiah 5:1-13):

When we say justice, we are referring to the Biblical meaning of justice not a definition held by any particular political party or social group. Biblically, justice means to hold the kings and nobles accountable for the fair treatment of all people, especially the poor, widow, and the orphan, or the most vulnerable

in our communities. In our time, that means holding people like the Mayor or School Superintendent accountable to protect and serve the most vulnerable people in Polk County. We "act justly" or "do justice" by coming together with other congregations and using our people power to get commitments from public officials to accomplish needed changes in our community.

PEACE, unlike the Interfaith Coalition of Polk County (see another article on page 5), focuses on one main issue a year. Since the organization relies on consensus from a broad spectrum of Christian traditions (Lutheran, AME, Methodist, Presbyterian, Catholic, Baptist, and more), the issue tends to be non-controversial in nature. For example, in 2024, the main issue is elder care.

During its February meeting, Reformation's congregational council received a presentation from PEACE. During its March meeting, the council discussed whether to join the organization. After two members offered to donate enough to cover the congregation's \$1,000 membership dues (so that there will be no impact to the 2024 budget), council voted to accept those donations and join on a one-year trial basis.

Want to learn more and maybe even get involved? PEACE will host its annual "Nehemiah Action" meeting on Monday, April 29, at 6:30 p.m. at Resurrection Catholic Church in Lakeland. You are invited! Please contact Pastor Lois for details.

SYNOD PARISH DEACONS RETREAT AT REFORMATION



Reformation will be hosting the Florida-Bahamas Synod's annual retreat for Synod Parish Deacons (SPDs) on April 19 (4 p.m. - 9 p.m.) and April 20 (8 a.m. to 2 p.m.). The theme this year is "Refresh and Renew" and the event is open to current and prospective SPDs as well as their pastors.

What's an SPD? A layperson with a combination of "some" theological training (such as our synod's School of Lay Ministry, formerly known as diakonia Florida) and practical experience (hands-on training gained by volunteering within a congregation) who serves as a deacon for

that congregation under the general oversight of their pastor. Pastor Lois served as an SPD before realizing she was called to ordained ministry, so ask her if you want more information.

What's going to happen during the retreat? Worship, including the affirmation of everyone's baptism. Education, including speakers and a panel discussion about the future of congregational ministry. Fun, including ice-breaker activities and fellowship during meals.

What's this got to do with me? Maybe you would like to help us host the event (take a twohour shift as a "go-fer" – sign-up sheet is on the credenza). If you are active in the congregation and feel called to collaborate in ministry with your pastor in a way other than serving on council, maybe you would rather attend the whole thing (talk to Pastor Lois and then pay a \$65 registration fee).
