

LITURGY AND OTHER "WORK OF THE PEOPLE" (INPUT REQUESTED)

You have undoubtedly heard Pastor Lois say this, whether in an announcement, during a sermon, or beginning a memorial service: our word "liturgy" is derived from a Greek word meaning "work of the people."

This is why we sing hymns during worship. This is why we pray certain prayers together and respond ("Thanks be to God" or whatever) at various points during worship. This is why worship is not simply a performance by the musician(s) and presiding minister; it is a group effort. The same is true outside of worship: Christian community, our life together as church, is meant to be "work of the people" (sometimes we are the ones being served; other times, we are the ones doing the serving).



How are you serving God (offering your talent, teach-ability, or tenacity to work for God)? Are you participating in worship as a greeter, assisting minister, usher, camera operator, or some other role? Are you helping with a fellowship function, outreach activity, or property project for Reformation? Are you glorifying God through your involvement in some non-church charity? If physical disability or physical distance prevents you from doing anything else, are you praying for the congregation and its leadership?

FOOD BARREL DONATIONS

There are times when **Talbot House Ministries** have been unable to take our donations especially during prime holidays as they get overwhelmed with other large contributions from grocery stores, etc. As a result, we will share our donations with **VISTE**, especially when this happens.

In checking with the staff at **VISTE**, I have found that food donations are always appreciated. They service the Lakeland, Bartow, Forte Mead, and



Mulberry areas for **seniors 70 and above**. Some of the most **"in need"** services are their food programs. Any nonperishable items would be fantastic. I want to let you know we will share our food that has always gone to **Talbot House Ministries** with the **VISTE** program. Their office

is located here in Lakeland. Please continue to place your nonperishable food in the food barrel and we will make certain that it gets delivered to either of these worthy causes.

The Supplemental Grocery program for **VISTE** provides a monthly supplement to over 1,200 households each month. Supplemental groceries are distributed to clients who can pick up during the first full week of each month

For those clients who are unable to pick up, volunteers help deliver during the third week of each month. The Supplemental Grocery program has grown tremendously since its inception, and ensuring quality product with nutritional value has become a great focus of VISTE's warehouse operations. I will be happy to answer any questions you may have regarding this program. It will be another wonderful way to spread our abundance locally with others beyond the walls of Reformation Lutheran Church.

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RETREAT RESULTS

PRAY IN MAY!

Followers of Jesus practice the "3 T's" of stewardship: time with God, talent for God, and treasure to God. Time with God is not limited to showing up for about an hour a week to worship God with other followers of Jesus. It also involves making a daily effort, usually in the form of at least 15 to 20 minutes of prayer. Here are suggested prayer topics for May:

• The "prayers of the people" (prayers of intercession) provided in each Sunday worship bulletin. Seriously. Pray those prayers!



Every day, starting on Sunday. That way, the people of "Reformation Nation" will be praying together for the church, the world, and those in need. Even if you are not able to pick-up a paper copy by participating in worship in-person every Sunday, you can get the bulletin e-mailed to you in advance; if you are not

already receiving it from lovinglutherans@gmail.com every Tuesday, send a message asking to be added to the distribution list.

- Each and every person on our e-mail prayer list. During worship each Sunday, the presiding minister adds the names of members, friends, and relatives with current concerns to the prayers of intercession. A complete list of those with long-term concerns is included on the announcement/reminder page of the worship bulletin. You can have all the names in one place if you ask Marilyn Hodge (who leads our congregational care team) to send you the weekly (Saturday) prayer list.
- Over the course of the month, "pray through" this newsletter.
 Re-read a page each day, then pray for the people and ministries associated with the articles on that page.

LUTHERANISM 101: EASTER (PART 2)

Similar to Christmas, Easter is a church season (not just one day on the calendar); this is why you may hear people refer to Eastertide or Eastertime. This year, May is the month we transition from Easter to Pentecost.

How long is Easter? You may have heard Easter referred to as a "week of weeks." This is because there are seven weeks (plus one day, technically) in the season. In other words, we keep on celebrating it long after the Cadbury eggs and secular décor (bunnies, chicks, and whatnot) are gone from our stores.

What do we do differently during Easter? Having welcomed back the word "Alleluia" on Resurrection Sunday (a word that is figuratively and sometimes literally "buried" or "locked-away" during Lent), we tend to sing joyous hymns with that word in the lyrics. The purple of Lent is replaced with white, cream, and/or gold in our worship space and on the pastor's vestments. The lectionary (our three-year cycle of Bible readings for Sunday worship) appoints verses from Acts instead of Old Testament books for our first readings. Also, as we do at Reformation, many churches temporarily replace the solemn "corporate confession and forgiveness" rite with a celebratory "thanksgiving for baptism" rite.



What is Ascension? Ascension is the day on the church calendar which commemorates when the post-resurrection Jesus departed Earth and returned to Heaven. In accordance with the account of the ascension found in Acts 1:3, it is celebrated 40 days after Resurrection Sunday. However, instead of leaving it on a Thursday (read: poorly attended weekday worship), some denominations and individual congregations "transfer" the commemoration to the following Sunday.

FEED THE HOMELESS

We started packing lunches for the homeless as the *Gods Work Our Hands* project in 2021. We decided that instead of peanut butter and jelly sandwiches, we were going to provide a more nutritional lunch. After some research, we decided that we could provide a lunch consisting of a can of soda, cup of fruit, spoon, napkins, wet wipes, a treat, two meat and cheese sandwiches, mustard and mayonnaise, and a bag of chips plus one or two 16 oz bottles of water. In 2021, the cost could be covered by \$5 per month from each household attending church. Guess what! Like everything else, prices have gone up and \$5 a month will no longer cover the cost to pack the lunches. It now takes \$7-10 per month to pack the lunches, It would be greatly appreciated if you could increase or start donating \$7-10 per month.

We pack the lunches in the fellowship hall immediately following worship on the third Sunday of the month. It takes approximately 20-25 minutes to pack the lunches and get them to the narthex for pickup by 11:30 am. There are several people who pack these lunches on a rotational basis. I usually have 4-6 women make the sandwiches and 3-4 men or women pack the lunches. There is a signup sheet available on the credenza in the narthex on the first Sunday of each month. *It is important that you sign up if you plan to help*. If I don't have a minimum of 8, I start recruiting people. It is a project that is quick, easy, and important. Try it if you have not. It's a good way to get to know a few more people.



PARTIAL UPDATE: POLK ECUMENICAL ACTION COUNCIL FOR EMPOWERMENT

In our April newsletter, we announced that Reformation is joining the Polk Ecumenical Action Council for Empowerment (PEACE), a local justice-oriented organization that can trace its origin back about 24 years old and has more than 22 member congregations from a broad spectrum of Christian traditions (Lutheran, AME, Methodist, Presbyterian, Catholic, Baptist, etc.).

Our involvement in PEACE is intended to be consistent with the organization's definition of justice (which comes from Micah 6:8 and Nehemiah 5:1-13):



When we say justice, we are referring to the Biblical meaning of justice—not a definition held by any particular political party or social group. Biblically, justice means to hold the kings and nobles accountable for the fair treatment of all people, especially the poor, widow, and the orphan, or the most vulnerable in our communities. In our time, that means holding people like the Mayor or School Superintendent accountable to protect and serve the most vulnerable people in Polk County. We "act justly" or "do justice" by coming together with other congregations and using our people power to get commitments from public officials to accomplish needed changes in our community.

Reformation's one-year trial membership cost \$1,000, which was paid for by two generous members of the congregation (council member Bobbie Harney and active newcomer Sylvia Shaw). Our involvement in PEACE will become a project of the Outreach Committee, with Sylvia Shaw and Barbara Caballero as co-leaders. The leaders and/or Pastor Lois will attend various meetings and invite other justice-minded congregation members to join what we hope will become a team of 8 or more people.

On April 8, the leaders and Pastor Lois attended a meeting in Winter Haven and heard updates on various issues being monitored, researched, and pursued by the organization. The meeting, attended by over 200 of our siblings in Christ, took place a short distance from an affordable housing complex that was the result of a commitment made to PEACE years ago by the city. Unfortunately, the need for affordable housing is immense. When the complex opened, it had more than 50 applicants for each housing unit.

On April 29 (the date this article is being finalized), an even bigger meeting is happening. The "Nehemiah Action" will likely have over 900 participants (8 from Reformation) and result in new commitments from Mayor Mutz and other local officials. Watch for an article about the outcomes of that meeting in the May newsletter!

WHILE YOU ARE AWAY ...

Facebook itself is free, but we need audio-visual technology, internet service, and electricity to have a "meta presence" for worship, devotions, and other ways we use social media to stay connected under circumstances that would otherwise keep us apart. We also sometimes use low-cost ads on Facebook to engage with people who have not yet visited us online or in-person.



To glorify God during our weekly worship experience, we have a talented music director who hones her craft by practicing during the week. Besides keeping her comfortable when she is on campus, we need "some" air conditioning in the sanctuary at all times (and a special humidity-control device) to protect investments in our organ and piano.

Two or more volunteers keep worship bulletins and other administrative tasks flowing each week, but they need a computer with software, a copier with paper and toner, working phones (part of our internet service), and electricity to offer-up their talents. When they are on campus, they also answer questions and otherwise assist callers and drop-in visitors.

Thanks be to God, we maintain a climate-controlled donation room (the former classroom) so that we can collect and sort food and other donated items to support our local ministry partners. Thanks be to God, we also maintain a climate-controlled fellowship hall for congregational purposes and for which we receive a monthly donation from Oasis (the Spanish-speaking congregation who uses it on Sunday afternoons and Wednesday evenings).

In fact, with a few exceptions like how many copies of each week's bulletin are made and how much water is used for (ahem) occupancy-dependent purposes, most of the congregation's expenses are relatively consistent year-round. That includes having a full-time pastor who is available to make local visits and also provide pastoral care anywhere by phone, text, and other means.

For all these reasons, please continue supporting Reformation financially even when health, vacations, or summertime "up north" keeps you away from campus. Doing so is especially important this year, as one of our most faithful supporters died a few months ago. Your long-distance participation can be as simple as mailing a check or using Reformation's online (Vanco) giving page.

In ancient times, a King had a boulder placed on a roadway. Then he hid himself and watched to see if anyone would remove the huge rock. Some of the King's' wealthiest merchants and courtiers came by and simply walked around it.. Many loudly blamed the King for not keeping the roads clear, but none did Anything about getting the stone out of the way. Then a peasant came along carrying a load of vegetables. Upon approaching the boulder, the peasant laid down his burden and tried to move the stone to the side of the road. After much pushing and straining, he finally succeeded. After the peasant picked up his load of vegetables, he noticed a purse lying in the road where the boulder had been. The purse contained many gold coins and a note from the King indicating that the gold was for the person who removed the boulder from the roadway. The peasant learned what many of us never understand! Every obstacle presents an opportunity to improve our condition.

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NEXT "TOWN HALL" ON JUNE 30TH

When a month has a "fifth Sunday" we hold a "town hall" meeting in the fellowship hall immediately after worship. Each of these meetings is intended as an informal chance for lay and ordained leadership to hear questions, concerns, and suggestions directly from members and friends of the congregation.

LUTHERANISM 101: PENTECOST (PART 1)



What is Pentecost? That depends on whether you are referring to the day or the "short-hand" name of our next church season! The Day of Pentecost is a major festival/feast day which takes place at the conclusion of Eastertide. For Christians, it commemorates the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the followers of Jesus who were gathered in Jerusalem as described in Acts 2:1–31. Previously, the Holy Spirit had only anointed and abided within one priest, prophet, or king at a time. Jesus, however, promised to send "another Advocate" to his followers. Red is the color of the Holy Spirit, so the white/cream/gold of Easter is replaced with red in our worship space and on the pastor's vestments.

INSTRUCTIONS

Praise & Pinch Feedback System

This method of feedback deals with joys, concerns, feelings, and opinions you may have about what is (or is not) happening at Reformation. It provides opportunity for you to communicate about ways we are doing well in our ministry together and areas that might need attention. Such input and feedback helps us all to be faithful in carrying out our mission.

Here's how the system works:

- 1. There is a confidential box in the narthex for receiving "Praise & Pinch" forms. Copies of these forms (instructions on one side, blanks to complete on the other side) are kept near the box.
- 2. Write out your praise(s) or pinch(es) on the form, sign it, and place it in the Praise & Pinch Box.
- 3. Forms will be collected by a member of the "Praise & Pinch" Committee.
- 4. You will be contacted to let you know that your form has been received and to clarify with you the content of your input and what you would like to see happen.
- 5. Following this conversation (#3 & #4 above), you will then be told how your message will be handled.
- 6. Your message will be delivered to the appropriate committee, subgroup, or person. Follow-through will include communicating to you the final outcome of your feedback.

Throughout this process, **confidentiality** will be maintained.
